It captures a Victorian Gothic architectural monument. A monument erected in memory of Sir Walter Scott in which his sculptured figure appears under the intimidating and distinct structure. A friend, recently visited Edinburgh, Scotland and I was captivated by his pics of 'The Scott Monument". A 287 step climb to the top. Designed by George Kemp and begun in 1840. Four years later and over 16,000 pounds this 61.1 m binny sandstone monument was complete. The detailing, size, and contrast amongst the current modern buildings makes this monument's "space" extraordinary. It challenges one to wonder.... Who was this Walter Scott: knighted and esteemed with such a legacy landmark? Why him? Why did the 'heavenly space' shine down on him?
